YEAR END AWARDS

Now that the competition season is heating up, remember to send in your results to Brooke Daneker, the club Points Coordinator. From www.mdcta.com click on Year End Awards tab on the left to find the forms you will need. Each rider needs to compile their results on the new Points Form, a single sheet of paper, one *line* for each event. Sending in your results more than once a year keeps Brooke from being inundated in November. If enough people send in forms we will post the "current" standings on line. Remember to do your 8 volunteer hours before the Dec 1 deadline and to send Brooke the Trophy Selection Form by then as well.

The club recognizes through 6th place in 15 different Year End Awards! Send in your results to be eligible for some nice prizes and recognition at the banquet. Also, ALL riders at any level who complete three events are eligible for the **TRIUMPH AWARD**. Send in your Competition Record, even if you don't have a placing (First through Sixth) that gives you points, it still counts!! Good Luck!

Important Note: The three events that are sponsored by the club – MCTA at Shawan Downs, The Starter Event and Jenny Camp Horse Trials – are granted **DOUBLE POINTS** when Year End Awards are calculated!

MCTA STARTER TRIALS AT GLENWOOD FARM

Despite sweltering heat, the MCTA Starter Trials held at Glenwood Farm on June 8th was a huge success. Times for cross country were altered in order to compensate for the heat, and at the end of the course, a cold bottle of water and a trough of ice water was on hand for competitors and their horses. Here are some comments from some of the riders:

From a Rider's View...

The organizers and volunteers did a great job all around. They were all so supportive and helpful. They handled the heat like pros, having coolers of ever-full ice water for competitors, lots of reminders to drink fluids and a trough of ice water at the XC finish line to cool down the horses.

Classes were reasonably sized and pinned to 8th place. As is the tradition, perpetual trophies were given out to winning members in several divisions. Great prizes like tote bags, leads, goodie bags, treats and lots of free samples were donated by generous sponsors. Finally, I'll tell you what really made it fun. This is the first event I have participated in as a competitor for about 4 years. 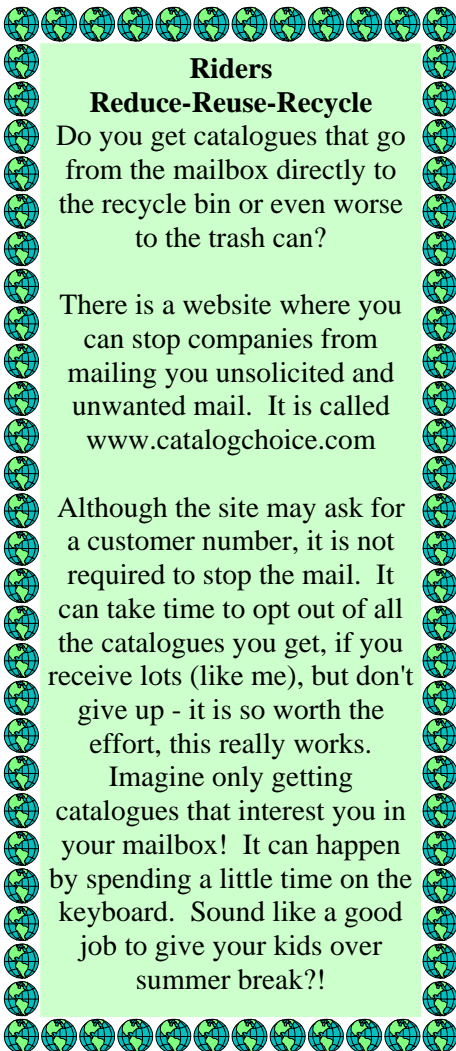

USEF / USEA SAFETY SUMMIT

After what has seemed like a growing number of major accidents in eventing, the first USEF / USEA Safety Summit was held in Lexington Kentucky June 7th and 8th. In attendance were about 250 people, including many upper level riders, trainers, organizers, course designers as well as amateurs and their families. The meeting was led by USEF president David O'Connor and USEA president, Kevin Baumgardner.

Items discussed were course design (including the use of frangible pins) rider responsibility and education.

After much discussion, the focus of the summit boiled down to achieving one goal, and that is to reduce falls of horses. While only about 2% of rider falls result in injury, falls of horses result in significantly more injuries. Non-rotational horse falls result in injury approximately 50% of the time, and rotational falls produce injuries at a rate of 85%. At this time data collecting is not complete, but data does indicate that falls of horses at the Preliminary and higher levels have increased significantly since 2003. Fortunately falls at the lower levels are still relatively rare. How to achieve this goal of reducing horse falls was the focus of following discussions.

Course design and construction was explored. Frangible pins were demonstrated by course designer Tremaine Cooper and course builder Eric Bull. Frangible pins allow the rail of a jump to drop when force is applied, which may reduce the severity of a rotational fall. The pins can be retrofitted to jumps already in existence, and the USEF has offered to supply them

free of charge to event organizers. Collapsible jumps were also demonstrated, but it was also noted that riders may take even more risks knowing the jumps were collapsible.

Dorothy Crowell expressed concern that lower level courses have become too technical, and are getting away from the original intention of Novice and Training levels as being introductory and educational, and this opinion was echoed by many.

Speed was also discussed, and a flag system was addressed, the idea being to use yellow or red flags to visually warn riders of excessive speed levels.

Much focus was spent on rider preparedness. It is obvious that riders are showing up unprepared, but how to ensure qualifications is what is needed to be resolved. Many ideas were explored: licensing, point systems, instructor certification, as well as educational initiatives. What many feel is needed is rewarding good riding.

It also became apparent that more data is needed in order to truly figure out why horses die in competition. It was suggested that every accident be investigated fully, as well as execute a central database to collect information on all accidents.

While most of the focus of the Safety Summit was on the upper echelon of eventing, where the catastrophic accidents have been occurring, it was noted that the entire eventing community needs to participate in a change of culture. David O'Connor said "Realize the responsibility you have when you get on your horse is the ultimate responsibility," it is the rider's job to keep things safe.

Glossary of Horse Terms

Hock: Financial condition of all horse owners.

Hobbles: Walking gait of a horse owner after their foot has been stepped on by their horse.

Three Gaited Horse: A horse that. 1) trips, 2) stumbles, 3) falls.

IS IT TOO HOT TO RIDE TODAY?

Man is it HOT today! The question is, is it too hot for you and your fuzzy friend to be outside doing work? Let's check it out. Both you and your horse perspire or sweat when your bodies need to cool themselves. The water in the sweat carries heat away from the body when it evaporates. However, when the relative humidity is high, we do not perspire or sweat as much.

"Hmmm", you say, "What do you mean by relative humidity?" Relative humidity is a term used to describe the amount of water vapor that exists in a gaseous mixture of air and water. Hereabouts, we call that 'muggy.' Water vapor is a lighter gas than air at the same temperature, so humid air will tend to rise. As relative humidity increases, first haze and then ultimately a thicker cloud cover will develop, reducing the amount of direct sunlight reaching the surface. Relative humidity is a good predictor of thunderstorms and other weather.

The Heat Index (HI) is an index that combines both air temperature and relative humidity to determine an 'apparent temperature' — how hot it actually feels. The higher the air temperature, the less relative humidity is needed to make the apparent temperature feel hotter. For example, at 80 ° F (approximately 27 °C), the heat index will agree with the actual temperature if the relative humidity is 45%, but at 110 °F (roughly 43 °C), any relative-humidity reading above 17% will make the Heat Index higher than 110 °F.

Humidity is thought not to raise the apparent temperature at all if the actual air temperature is below 68 °F (20 °C) — essentially the same temperature colder than when wind chill is thought to begin.

It should be noted that heat indexes are based on temperature measurements taken in the shade and not the sun, so extra care must be taken while you are in the sun.

Note that exposure to full sunshine can increase heat index values by up to 15 °F (8 °C)!
